
The more we share each others company and expertise the more we gain. Keep up the good work all you Branch Members, you're doing a fine job! **Joy Kipling**

THE BELLS OF ST. CADOC'S, PENDOYLAN

The church of St. Cadoc has had bells for 300 years. The original four were given to the church and people in the late 1650s by the avid royalist and judge, David Jenkins, in thanks for his release from imprisonment. He was captured following the siege of Hereford in December 1645, imprisoned, tried for writing treasonous pamphlets, was on the list of those to be hanged by the rump parliament in 1650, had his Hensol Estate confiscated in 1652 and was finally released and given back his estates in 1657 just before the restoration of the monarchy.

The limestone tower dates from the 12th century although it is believed that a pre-Norman church already existed on this site. The architect firm,

Bruton and Williams of Cardiff were in charge of a major restoration project in 1892 when the tower was extensively refurbished and the existing four bells were recast by Charles Carr of Smethwick. A new frame was constructed and the



following year they were augmented to 6 with the addition of 2 trebles.

Time took its toll on the fittings and an application was made to the Millennium Commission for a grant to re-tune the bells and replace the

frame and fittings. Sadly, this was unsuccessful but fund raising continued and a new set of ropes was purchased.

In 2023 the local Llandaff and Monmouth DACBR bell maintenance group inspected the ring and carried out extensive minor repairs to the fittings.


NEWS FROM AROUND THE BRANCH


Aberavon

A DAY WITH THE BELL MAINTENANCE GROUP

On Friday 14th July I had the pleasure of spending a day working with

the Bell Maintenance Group (BMG) on two Association towers. The morning was at Bedwellty (GF 8, 14-0-14) where we fixed stays, replaced missing bolts, and tied on a replacement rope, to leave them in a good ringable condition. This was followed by a short trip to Ebbw Vale (8, 24-3-25) to tighten a clapper and overhaul a sticking pulley. I know plenty of ringers never venture above the ringing chamber, or even think about what is happening upstairs when we pull on a rope, but this is a huge mistake. Bells only remain safe and pleasurable to ring, when someone is doing the skilled work of keeping them in good order.

As many towers in the Association no longer have a regular band or an



experienced steeple keeper, we are extremely lucky to have a group of dedicated volunteers, able to help with this work. I certainly learnt more about bell maintenance in just a few hours with the BMG, than I picked up during years of ringing in my youth. As a teenager, the most I was ever asked to do was to oil the plain (or is it plane?) bearings at the tower

where I learned. Although, I well remember going up to see the stump of a broken stay (not mine - honest!) and being glad it wasn't my job to fix it!

For those interested in bell maintenance, volunteering with the BMG can be a great experience. And, if you do a good job, Joy will offer some of her wonderful cake at lunchtime to keep you motivated! Even if you are not practically minded, I still recommend you ask to go up to the belfry whenever you can, just to wonder at the mechanics that allows us to ring bells full circle and create their glorious sound. If you pick a tower as impressive as Ebbw Vale, the sheer size and beauty of the bells we ring week in, week out, can be an awe-inspiring sight!

PHILIP JOHN EVANS 1935 - 2023

Phil was born and grew up in Shrewsbury where he later became an accomplished ringer at St Chad's Church. Following military service he entered the railway industry where he spent all of his working life and he eventually moved on promotion to work in Cardiff and took up residence in Caerphilly. This coincided with the formation of our new band of ringers at St Martin's Church in 1974 and although Phil was initially reluctant to come and join those teaching us he did join us as part of the band once we were considered able to proceed on our own. His experience was a very important factor in the development of our fledgling band and we appreciated how he continued to support us for the rest of his ringing life rather than thinking of moving elsewhere where he would have had a chance to make wider use of the abilities he had

previously developed. He and his wife, Anne, also became regular members of St Martin's congregation.

Since the majority of his recordable ringing achievements occurred prior to his joining us it is not easy to establish what he attained precisely but a flavour can be given by the fact that when in December 1979 our band had reached the stage where five of us rang our first peal, of Plain Bob Doubles, Phil, who conducted us, rang his hundredth. Situated in Caerphilly he did not really come into regular contact with any of the various groups who regularly rang peals or quarter peals but, especially in a period when we held regular joint practices with the ringers of Llanbradach and Bedwellty, he did come into contact with others who opened some windows for such activity which we were always pleased to see him undertake. In addition, he rang a further three peals with Caerphilly bands together with a considerable number of quarter peals. Eventually, health problems meant he was initially unable to make the steps up to our tower and then, subsequently, to ring at all so our contacts with him inevitably became less, though we tried to maintain a measure of contact to show him he was not forgotten.

Within and outside ringing Phil always enjoyed social activity. In his early days with us he was a member of a skittles team, later he learned Welsh (not much use when communicating with the rest of our band), he and Anne had life tickets to the Waverley and Balmoral paddle steamers (from which they regularly obtained much enjoyment) and in latter times he had much pleasure 'collecting' Wetherspoons pubs. A life he lived to the fullest possible and his rest well earned.
